Your letter of July 20, 1973, inquiring about the gun taken from one Terrence B. Norman in May, 1970, has been received.

This weapon was a Model 36 Smith and Wesson revolver, serial number 253828. The weapon was received by the FBI on May 5, 1970, after passing through the hands of four police officers. The FBI conducted no examination of the weapon since it had passed through so many hands and since an examination could only show if the gun had been previously fired, not as to whether it had been fired at a specific time. The weapon was turned over to Mr. Seabury Ford, Special Assistant Attorney General for Ohio, on August 24, 1970, along with other evidence in this case, and I have no knowledge of its present whereabouts.

Senator Birch Bayh (D.-Ind.) on the afternoon of 8/3/73 held a press conference in the Senate Judiciary Committee Room in which he stated that he was happy to learn that the Attorney General has authorized Assistant Attorney General J. Stanley Pottinger to conduct an additional inquiry into the shooting of 4 Kent State students in May, 1970. A copy of the statement issued during the press conference by Senator Bayh was obtained and is enclosed.

A considerable portion of this statement deals with information furnished by the Director to Senator Bayh in answer to questions submitted by the Senator during the Directors confirmation hearings. These questions and a major portion of Senator Bayh's statement concern the "mysterious role" of Terrence B. Norman and the .38 caliber revolver taken from Attached to the statement issued by the Senator are copies of a letter from the Senator to the Attorney General dated 8/2/73 and a copy of a letter he received on 8/2/73 from an officer in the Ohio National Guard who was in command of an infantry company at Kent State and copies of statements signed by 2 of his men. The Senator in his letter concludes that these items indicate it was quite possible that Norman fired the first shot.

I am happy to see that Attorney General Elliot L. Richardson has announced today that he has authorized Assistant Attorney General J. Stanley Pottinger to conduct an additional inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the fatal shooting of four Kent State University students by members of the Chio National Guard on May 4, 1970.

I wrote to Assistant Attorney General Pottinger urging Just such a course on July 9, 1973. During the confirmation hearing for FBI Director Charence Kelley, a story in the Akron Bencon Journal drew my attention to the stell mysterious role of one Mr. Terrence B. Norman. The story raised questions concerning what role Mr. Normanawas playing at Kont State, why he was carrying a gun, and has he was able to stay on campus after it was closed.

On June 25, 1973, I submitted to Mr. Kelley a series of written questions in an effort to determine what, if anything, the FBI had done to investigate allegations, that Norman may have precipitated the firing by National Guardamer at Kent State by firing his .38 caliber revolver.

PEH Director Kelley reported on July 9, 1973 that Terrence BL Norman has never been under contract cardirectly employed by the FBI. However, Mr. Kelley reported that in April 1970, less than a month before the Kent State shootings, Norman had supplied information of value to the FBI regarding the National Socialist White People's Party, an outgrowth of the American Numi Party, for which he recieved a cash payment of \$125. Mr. Kelley said Norman's .38 caliber snubnose revolver was sourcendered to Patrolman Harold Rice of the Kent State University Police Department on Kay 4, 1970. It then passed through the hands of several other members of the Kent State police force before being turned over to the FBI on Hay 5, 1970. The FBI laboratory, however, did not examine the gun to determine whather if had been fired, Kelley said, since the gun had passed through a number of hands before coming into FBI custody. Such a laboratory examination, he said, called only show whether the gun had been fired recently, but not as to whether it had been fired on the specific date in question.

In response to other questions, Mr. Kelley said the FBI initiated an investigation of the incident on May 5, 1970 at the request of the Assistant Attorney General, Civil Rights Division, U.S. Department of Justice and results of the investigation were reported to the Justice Department.

Mr. Kelley indicated the FBI did not probe into circumstances by which Norman

Guard and did not investigate why Norman, allegedly a regular student, was able to be on campus May 5 after the campus had officially been closed and the press had been excluded from the campus. He also reported that the FBI has no information as to why Norman was not subposeraed by the Ohio State Grand Jury and said the FBI does not know the location of Mr. Norman presently. Significantly, Kelley also indicated there had been no questioning of Mr. Norman since the date of the shootings.

There are several obvious gaps in the original investigation, particularly as concerned the role of Mr. Norman.

The question of why Mr. Norman was never interviewed by the FBI has not been answered.

The question of why Mr. Norman, was able to remain on the campus after it had been officially closed and after the press had been excluded was not answered.

The question of how Mr. Norman received accredited press credentials was not investigated by the FBI.

Recently, since that time, I have received information from a company commander of the Ohio National Guard raising even more serious questions as to the thoroughness of the original investigation. I have today transmitted to Attorney General Richardson a letter from that Company Commander and two exhibits in the form of signed statements from members of his unit in the Ohio National Guard.

The letter of the Company Commander and the statements of two members of his company indicate Mr. Norman was present during the fusillade which killed the students.

The company commander states that he questioned four of his men who indicated that "as Norman ran toward our lines, people were chasing him yelling 'Stop that man -- he killed someone'." The Commander quotes a lieutenant in his unit as indicating that he had overheard Norman tell the Kent State rolice "I think I shot one of the students -- the students grabbed me and started beating me, so I pulled my gun." The Commander included in his letter to me the handwritten statements of two of his men who corroborate this version of the event.

In spite of the fact that there was thun substantial reason to believe that Norman may have in fact fired his gun, the commander reports that he was unable to arouse any interest on the part of the FBI when he reported the information to them.

The tragedy which occurred at Kent State was perhaps the most shocking and

traumatic event in the long history of student unrest through the period of the late 1950's and early 1970's. I believe that it is imperative that in this of all cases the American people have full confidence that justice has been fully and impartially carried out. I have, of course, forwarded this information to the Attorney General. I hope that the re-opened investigation announced today by Assistant Attorney General Pottinger will proceed forthwith to at last see to it that all the facts are fully made known.

Dear Mr. Attorney General:

As you may know, during the course of Mr. Kelley's confirmation hearings I submitted certain questions to him to be answered for the record once he assumed his position as Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. These involved the activities of Mr. Terrence B. Norman during the tragic killings at Kent State University on May 4, 1970. On July 9, 1973, Mr. Kelley submitted his answers to these questions.

As a result of certain press reports concerning Director Kelley's response, I received today a letter from an officer in the Ohio National Guard who was in command of an infantry company on the Kent State Campus. I enclose a copy of his letter, together with handwritten statements signed by two of his men. These seem to indicate that it is quite possible that it was in fact Norman who fired the first shot. As Director Kelley indicated, the FBI did not perform a ballistics test on the weapon.

because this information appears to me to be highly significant, I am forwarding it to you and would request that you take the necessary steps to see to it that Mr. Norman's role in this unhappy occurrence is fully explored.

It was with much interest that I read a report by WM. in your investigation of the Kent State matters, especially those involving the mysterious reporter, Terry Norman.

On May 4, 1970, I was in command of Co. N.:

involved in the quote "skirmish line". It was through my men that Terry Norman returned after the shooting incident in which the four students were killed. Although I did not personally apprehend him, the incident came immediately to my attention and I attempted to gather all the information I could on the matter. Without any formal investigative capibilities, I was only able to gather statements from my own men and tried to relate these to the official investigative bodies which. I came in contact with

In addition to the copies of statements of two of my men which are enclosed with this letter, I also have the notes which I made while questioning several others who were near enough to the incident to have knowledge of it. Four enlisted men made the following statement, "as Norman ran toward our lines, people were chasing him yelling "stop that man - he killed someone". Another man, a lieutement overheard Norman tell the campus police, "I think I shot one of the students - the students grabbed me and started heating me, so I pulled my gun". As you will see from the attached statements, they are in agreement with the above statements.

The FBL seemed to show no interest whatever in these statements whenever I reported them and, in a letter from J. Edgar Hoover to Congressman John Ashbrook, the Director stated that the FBI never heard of Norman nor employed him. However, I notice that they now admit to having paid him for some information in April 1970. I believe the above mentioned letter was prompted by Sgt. _____ (one of the attached statements is his) inquiry through Congressman John Ashbrook, 16th Chio Congressional District into this matter.

In addition to the above statements, Terry Norman had one other contact with the Ohio National Guard that I am aware of. It was with a member of another unit whose duty it was to issue press passes to personnel who were authorized to have them. In my questioning of this Guardsman, he reported that Norman attempted to get a press pass several times but was refused because he had no credentials. Norman then brought a person, believed by this guardsman to be a campus policeman, with him to apply for one. This individual stated that Norman should be issued a press pass because he was working for the FBI. When asked again for credentials this individual replied, "well not as an agent, just taking pictures". Norman was then issued a press pass on this basis. It should be noted here that none of the people making these statements or myself were called on to testify before the Grand Jury investigating, the Kent incident.

If a check were made of the Akron City police files, I believe Terry Norman's name will appear therein for impersonating a police officer or carrying a weapon without a permit; however, this is not directly related to the May 4th incident.

If the above information is of no value to you, please feel free to disregard it; however, I would be willing to supply names of the personnel who made the statements; contained herein, if desired. My only request being that these persons not be undully harrassed as they have been in the past.

My interest in this matter is simply that this incident with Norman has never been fully answered to my satisfaction, I always wondered if the gun which the FBI checked was actually the one which Norman turned over on May 4 to persons other than the FBI,

I would appreciate if this letter would be treated confidentially as I am still a member of the Ohio National Guard and am still under indictment in the civil suits pending in the courts over the May 4th killings. I will, however, be willing to discuss at anytime what I know of this matter.

"I, ..., observed on May 4, 1970 the following: A number of people running down the hill yelling "stop that man - he shot someone". I glanced to my right and saw a young man showing a press pass to a guardsman and passing bim. I moved towards him along with a number of other people. He was stopped 10 yds behind our line by 4 or 5 people. A plain closed sickofficial and stopped him and was asking him questions. I heard the young man say: "a student grabbed my camera and started to beat me up -- I shot " - He then reached inside his jacket and removed a silver colored pistol which was taken from him and he was led away. He was a short and blond haired, wearing slacks, white shirt, jacket, and had a camera around his neck."

"I, ..., a member of Co. of the Ohio National Guard did and in the capture of a civilian who was said to have had fired a pistol and hit a statent during the dispersing of an authorized rally at Kent State University, Kent, Chio. After completing our mission of dispersing the students, I along with a fellow guard member returned to where we began our mission. Within the or three minutes a civilian approached a line we had formed, presented a presenced and we let him pass through. He had gone approximately ten to twenty fleet to my immediate rear when some other civilians who I think were newsmen came number down the hill to our front pointing and shouting "stop that man." Within ten to fifteen seconds four or five guardsmen including myself had him surrounded with hayorater; pointing towards him and within a few inches of his body. He didn't aimment to excape. He held out his press card and kept saying over and over in a said table voice. "They were trying to kill me." I took his card and examined Ht. It looked official The name on the card was Terry Gordon, but I don't remember the mane of the people he worked for. We held him until some policemen came, and upon reaching his person, found a small pistol. The young man looked to be aking all years of age. He was of thin build, and approximately 5 ft. 9 inv. stalls. He had medium length blond hair. He was of fair complextion. He was wester a long sleeve button up yellow shirt and had a camera hanging around his reck.

"That is all I remember about him, and of the incident."

He reported he did say that Norman may have been hustling to get information and might, thereafter, contemplate peddling this information. He emphasized that he had not intended in any manner to voice any criticism of the FBI.

I thanked Senator Bayh for this report and told him that I hoped things could be worked out so that a Norman situation could be cleared up.



Your letter of July 20, 1973, inquiring about the gun taken from one Terrence B, Norman in May, 1970, has been received. This weapon was a Model 36 Smith and Wesson revolver, serial number 253828. The weapon was received by the FBI on May 5, 1970, after passing through the hands of four police officers. The FBI conducted noexamination of the weapon since it had passed through so many hands and since an examination could only show if the gun had been previously fired, not as to whether it had been fired at a specific time. The weapon was turned over to the Ohio State Police, along with other evidence in this case, and I have no knowledge of its present whereabouts.

During the confirmation hearings of Director Kelley, Senator Birch Bayh proposed a list of ten questions concerning the above-captioned matter. These questions were forwarded verbatim to the Cleveland Office for reply as that office was the office of origin handling the investigation.

There has apparently arisen some conflict concerning our reply to question 10 which stated, "Have there been any subsequent questionnings of Mr. Norman since May 4, 1970? If so please list offices involved, date, place and any other pertinent information." This question was interpreted by the Cleveland Office to be asking whether or not the FBI had received any inquiries concerning Norman since 5/4/70 and they replied that there had been no such inquiries. In answer to Senator Birch Bayh's question we replied that there had been no subsequent questionings of Norman by the FBI since 5/4/70.

REC-67 Apparently on the basis of information received from the Department, Senator Bayh has alleged that we interviewed Terrance B. Norman on 5/10 and again on 5/17/70. The facts are that we interviewed Terrance B. Norman at length on 5/4/70 at which time he stated that he had been attacked by a group of students after the shooting by the National Guard had occurred. To protect himself he drew a .38 caliber weapon to defend himself and then ran toward the lines of the Ohio National Guard. He was stopped by Patrolman of the Kent State University Police and he immediately surrendered himself and the gun. He did not fire the gun and the gun was examined by the Kent State University Police and it was determined that all chambens of the gun were fully loaded and the gun did not have an odor or appear to have been fired recently. what he was doing and offered to give him copies of any photographs taken if he desired them. Norman specifically stated that this offer was merely a friendly gesture and was not being made in any official capacity. The press pass which he had obtained was granted to him by the Kent State University Police and the FBI had no part in his having been on the campus. This interview of 5/4/70 was contained in an interview report form dated 5/10/70 which may have caused the confusion indicating Norman had been interviewed on that date.

After conducting further interviews concerning Norman's presence on the campus, it was necessary to recontact him on 5/15/70 to verify certain statements he made in his original interview. He was questioned in greater detail concerning his dress and concerning the revolver which he had been carrying and he reiterated precisely his previous statement. This recontact with Norman was recorded on an interview report form dated 5/16/70 which may have misled other persons to believe he had been interviewed on that date.

The above sets forth the only two contacts with Norman concerning this matter. It is pointed out that the incident concerning Norman was confirmed by interviews with other persons who observed this incident and the incident in fact occurred subsequent to the shooting outburst by the National Guard wherein the students were killed and this incident could not have precipitated the shooting on the part of the National Guard.



Your letter of August 27, 1973, to Mr. J. Stanley Pottinger, Assistant Attorney General, Civil Rights Division, U. S. Department of Justice, has been referred to this Bureau for appropriate handling.

For your information, the FBI received a letter from Congressman John M. Ashbrook dated August 13, 1970, in which he enclosed a letter from Mr. dated July 26, 1970. Mr. indicated in his letter that Terrence B. Norman was working for the FBI at the time of the Kent State University occurrence on May 4, 1970. In reply to Congressman Ashbrook he was advised that Mr. Norman was not working for the FBI on May 4, 1970, and had never been connected with the FBI. This reply to Congressman Ashbrook was addressed solely to the question of Norman's alleged employment status with the FBI and was not intended to imply that Norman had not been known to the FBI prior to May 4, 1970.

In the questions which you submitted to me Tat my confirmation hearings before the Senate Committee con the Judiciary you specifically inquired as to whether Mr. Norman has ever been under contract, been employed by, for received funds from the PBI. I advised you that he had never been under contract or directly employed by the FBI as this Bureau had similarly advised Congressman Ashbrook. In reply to your inquiry as to whether he had received funds from the FBI I accurately advised you that he had received a cash payment of \$125 on April 29, 1970, for information which he voluntarily furnished to the FBI concerning activities of the National Socialist White People's Party.

In connection with the confrontation of students with National Guardsmen on the Kent State University campus, 5/4/70, Senator Birch Bayh sent a letter to Assistant Attorney General Pottinger in which he pointed out that in August, 1970, the FBI had advised that Terrence B. Norman who had been present on the Kent State campus on 5/4/70 in possession of a gun was not working for the FBI on 5/4/70 and had never been connected with the FBI. He also pointed out that in answer to questions he submitted to Director Kelley in his confirmation hearings he learned that Norman had supplied information of value to the FBI for which he had received a cash payment of \$125 prior to the 5/4/70 incident. He considered this an inconsistency and requested an explanation. In his letter to the Department, Bayh mentions that according to Director Kelley's answers a ballistic test was not performed on Norman's gun by the FBI. The facts are that Norman's gun had passed through the possession of 4 Kent State University police officers before it was turned over to the FBI on 5/5/70 and it was sent to the FBI Laboratory The Laboratory did examine the gun insofar as it was possible; however, it is not possible to conduct an examination of a weapon and determine whether or not it had been fired at a particular point in time in the In response to Senator Bayh's questions to Director Kelley, we advised him that no examination was made as to whether the gun had been fired because it is not possible to make such an examination.

Dear General Pottinger:

As you are aware, I have for several years followed closely the developments in the Kent State case. I was, of course, pleased that the Department decided to re-open the investigation. In that regard, I enclose copies of two documents. The first is a letter from former Director Hoover to Congressman John Ashbrook dated August 18, 1970 stating that Mr. Terrence Norman "was not working for the FBI on May 4, 1970, nor has he ever been in any way connected with this Bureau." In the answers to the questions involving Kent State which I submitted to FBI Director Kelley in his confirmation hearings it is stated that "he (Norman) supplied information of value to the FBI regarding the National Socialist White People's Party (NSWPP) for which he received a cash payment of \$125." I would appreciate it if you would, if possible, provide an explanation for this apparent inconsistency.

Secondly, I enclose a copy of a letter from Paul W. Brown.

Attorney General of Ohio, dated September 21, 1970 to

then a member of the Ohio National Guard, whose written

statement I have previously furnished to the Department. In that letter

Attorney General Brown indicates that Ohio authorities may have performed a ballistics test on Norman's gun, something which, according to Director Kelley's answers, was not done by the FBI laboratory.

Thank you for your attention in this matter. If I should receive any other information relevant to the re-opened investigation, I will, of course, forward it to you.

It would appear in many instances that the additional investigation request was previously conducted during May or through the Summer of 1970 and reported in the various reports in this matter. Thus, it is possible that an incomplete reading or review of the previous investigation reported has resulted in the issuing of the supplementary requests.

Of the remaining items still to be handled, which relate to either TERRY NORMAN, the Ohio National Guard photographs, evidence and evidence examination or clarification, the following general observations are offered:

It would appear that with regard to TERRY NORMAN, the entire matter relating to NORMAN has previously been scrutinized from all aspects and thoroughly satisfied. The remaining investigation includes matters whose relevance is not apparent including whether or not a particular person may have issued press credentials to NORMAN or have knowledge of same. In this regard the existence of press credentials or lack thereof of one individual on the college campus where literally thousands of other persons, including nonstudents, were present, is not known.

The following additional observations were furnished which coincide with the recent Departmental request of October 10, 1973, but do not appear on the accompanying LHM furnished with this communication or may not be completely resolved.

Concerning Item 1, a. of page 1 of the Department's memorandum, it is believed this matter will be responded to by the FBI Laboratory. Same concerns the examination of weapon in possession of TERRY NORMAN.

Regarding Item 1, f., page 3, it is believed that with the exception of attempting to obtain a copy of the bonding papers relating to TERRY NORMAN's legally possessing a weapon, this matter in essence has been previously handled.

As noted in the enclosed LHM, a response is offered to Item m., page 7 of the Department's letter of October 10,

1973, which is somewhat representative of the type of additional investigative items requested. As specified in the enclosed LHM, the previous interview of stablished that admitted to shooting in the direction of an unidentified student. The additional investigation be requested is to attempt to locate an unknown individual who claims that made the same claim to him.

Item 3, beginning on page 7, a., sub (a) through sub (s); Item b, page 8, sub items (a) through (c) and Items c, d, and e, page 9, refer to the availability of pertinent photographs.

With respect to Item 3, a., pages 7 and 8, regarding photographic evidence of the 19 persons listed to contact for photographs, seven of these individuals had been previously contacted, photographs obtained and furnished to the Bureau or upon interview, advised they had not in fact taken photographs.

Photographs of three of the remaining twelve individuals are maintained by the Cleveland Office and will be forwarded in the future.

Item e,, page 9, can best be handled by the Departmental Attorney personally observing the master set of photographs at the Cleveland Office. Bureau will note that inasmuch as this is a master set the Bureau should be reluctant to part with same.

Item 4, a. through k., pages 9 through 14, generally requested FBI Laboratory clarifications or responses to evidence examinations. In addition some requests for interviews are also set forth in that section.

For information of the Bureau the above comments and observations are offered as possible assistance in a recommended discussion with Departmental Attorney concerning the request for additional investigation.

It is recommended that these observations be brought to the attention of ROBERT A. MURPHY, Departmental Attorney, and in addition that MURPHY travel to Cleveland and personally

discuss the entire matter with appropriate personnel of the Cleveland Office as he has previously indicated his willingness and desire to do so.

For information of the Bureau, a review of the 17 page Departmental memorandum has determined the existence of the potential for at least 96 interviews. Of these 96 interviews it is believed that 38 have been satisfactorily previously handled, reported and explained on the accompanying LHM and the reports previously furnished in May through July, 1970.

In addition there is the potential for at least 39 additional interviews with regard to Item g., pages 12 and 13, which requests the locating of weapons of the respective guardsmen depending upon an anticipated discussion with Departmental Attorney MURPHY.

Until advised to the contrary by the Bureau, Cleveland is holding any active investigation in this matter in abeyance, pending a discussion with Departmental Attorney ROBERT A. MURPHY.

With reference to Item 1., i., on page 1015 of Cleveland Division report, dated May 11, 1970, Detective Campus Police Department, Kent State University (KSU). advised that on May 4, 1970 he recieved from Detective of the Campus Police Department. The revolver obtained from TERRY NORMAN. Detective furnished this revolver and five rounds of ammunition from the gun to the FBI on May 5, 1970. The revolver was a Smith and Wesson, Model 36, serial number 253828.

b6 - 4b7C - 4

In reference to Part 2, Section a., General ROBERT H. CANTERBURY, Assistant Adjutant General, Ohio National Guard (ONG), when interviewed on May 6, 1970 estimated that on May 2, 1970 approximately 450 men from the 145th Infantry, ONG, had arrived in Kent, Ohio by approximately 10:30 p.m. On May 3, 1970, General CANTERBURY estimated that 400 additional ONG members from the 107th Armored Cavalry were brought to the Kent State University (KSU) campus. This estimate is contained in an interview with General CANTERBURY on page 38 of the preliminary report.

In the supplemental report of July 30, 1970, beginning on page 263, General CANTERBURY furnished a breakdown of the total National Guard force on the KSU campus on May 4, 1970. General CANTERBURY advised on July 21, 1970 that a total of 561 ONG personnel were on the campus on May 4, 1970 and that 230 of these men were from the 107th Armored Cavalry.

A thorough review of the files concerning the KSU incident failed to reflect that a complete roster of every National Guardsman was ever furnished.

It is possible that an exact record or knowledge of the identities of members and officers in the ONG does not exist or is not known.



(Winchester-Western Cartridge Division of Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp.) in 1953. The K12 cartridges are 7.62 Nato (.308 Winchester) military cartridges of the same manufacturer which were manufactured in 1968. Therefore, they are different from the K2, K14 and K17 cartridges.
- 4j. Q52 was examined in the FBI Laboratory and it was found that Q52 is a .45 Auto caliber copper-jacketed bullet which was fired from a barrel having six lands and grooves, left twist. Although the rifling impressions in this bullet are the same as those produced by the submitted U.S. Pistols, there are not sufficient microscopic marks remaining on Q52 for identification purposes. It was not possible to determine the manufacturer of this bullet from its physical characteristics.
- 4k. Specimen Q245 is a .45 Auto caliber military cartridge case which is like the Q120, Q170, Q179 and Q240 cartridge cases as well as the cartridge case portion of the K13 cartridge. There are not sufficient microscopic marks of value on specimen Q245 for identification purposes. Therefore, it is not possible to determine if this cartridge case had been fired in one of the submitted U.S. Pistols.
- 5d. The roll of 16mm black and white film has been spliced and repaired.

Specimens Q242 through Q245 and the sixty-seven prints made from specimen Q244 will be returned to you separately. No photographs have been retained.
