The Bureau's attention is invited to Cleveland case captioned "UNKNOWN SUBJECTS: KILLING OF FOUR STUDENTS, KENT STATE UNIVERSITY (KSU), KENT, OHIO, MAY 4, 1970; ALLISON KRAUSE; JEFFREY GLENN MILLER; SANDRA LEE SCHEUER; WILLIAM SCHROEDER - VICTIMS. CR."

As the Bureau is aware, over the weekend of May 1-2, 1970, student disorder broke out on the campus of KSU, Kent, Ohio. The Ohio National Guard (ONG) was summoned to the campus, and on May 4, 1970, during a student disruption four students were shot to death and nine others wounded, supposedly by the ONG.

For information of the Bureau, PROB) is a free-lance photographer during his free time and has sold photographs to the KSU Police Department in the past. On May 4, 1970, informant was at KSU on his own volition taking photographs of the disorder. After the shooting had started, about six of the demonstrators observed informant taking photographs and, thinking he was a newspaper photographer, attacked him and commenced beating him up. Informant had armed himself with a .38 caliber snub nose revolver - his own personal property - and, after being knocked to the ground, drew his revolver from his pocket and ordered his attackers to withdraw. He then ran to nearest group of policemen and surrendered himself and his revolver to them.

Informant stated he was so scared that when the police asked him who he was he told them his name and said he was there taking photographs on behalf of the KSU Police and the FBI. During interview with informant, he admitted he was there on his own volition and not on FBI instructions, but at the time of the incident he was trembling and so scared that he could think of nothing else to say.

Prior to this incident, SA who is acquainted with informant, saw him briefly during the disorder, and informant told him he was taking photographs which he was going to turn over to the KSU Police and that if we wanted copies we could possibly get them from the KSU Police.

Informant's revolver was examined by KSU Security Chief DONALD SCHWARTZMILLER immediately after informant had surrendered it, and it was fully loaded and had not been fired. At present no charges have been lodged against informant for carrying this weapon on campus.

Although informant's photograph has appeared in the newspapers, his association with the Bureau has not been divulged through local news media.

Based on above information, it is Cleveland's recommendation that PROB) be continued as an informant until such time that his association with the Bureau is divulged or at such time he may have charges placed against him for carrying a concealed weapon on the KSU campus.

This matter being followed closely. Bureau will be kept advised.

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Tells How He Saw . KSU Campus Battle

Terry Norman is a Kent State University junior, a free-lance photographer and afraid for his life.

Shortly after noon Monday he said he saw more than 1.000 rock-throwing students back 40 National Guardsmen against the wall at Taylor Hall.

He said the Guardsmen, out of tear gas, dedged rocks and bricks and bottles from nearly point-blank range.

He said Guardsmen were struck and downed.

He said he heard what he

He said he heard what he thought was a shot from the roof of Taylor Hall.

He said some downed Guardsmen opened fire into the students, while others fired warning shots over their heads and into car windows in a nearby parking lot.

FINALLY, he saw four students killed, and when he stroped to aid a stricken youth, he was surrounded by others who raged, "Get the pig, get the pig," thinking Norman was a police photographer.

He said they pummeled and kicked him, and when one cried, "Stick the pig," and went for a knife, Norman pulled out a 38 caliber pistol, waved it, and scared them off. Then he ran for his life, right into the arms of Nation-

al Guardsmen.

Later it was reported on television that he precipitated the tragedy, that he ran at the Guardsmen with a pistol, and that they opened fire in his

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NORMAN'S story began Saturday night, after radicals torched the ROTC building on the KSU campus.

His sources told him that between 7:30 and 9 p. m. Sunday the rest of the wooden buildings would be burned down and that LSD would be put into the Kent water supply.

However, Norman found litile to photograph Saturday, and not much more Sunday, until 7:30. Then a large crowd gathered on campus and moved downtown for a sit-in in the street.

Four times, between the campus and the sit-in, Norman said his life was threatened.

SO MONDAY, when Norman packed his camera on campus, he took along his .38.

This day started at noon,

when the still nameless group of radicals, many of whom he says are outside ag some says and I didn't recognize even half of them" — held a rally on the Commons.

He figured there were "about 300" of them, with "maybe 2.00" onlookers standing on nearby hillsides.

Next, a line of "oh, 100" National Guardsmen approached to about 125 yards. The radicals on the Commons began to yell obscenities at the Guardsmen," Norman said, plus chanting "Ho, Ho, Ho Chi Minh, NLF Is Gonna Win." A few waved black flags of anarchy, he said.

AT THAT point, a National Guard seep pulled into the Commons and a KSU policeman with a bullhorn pleaded with the radicals to break it up, Norman said.

The policeman was stoned and retreated Meanwhile, students from the hillsides joined the radicals, Norman said.

About five minutes later the jeep made another foray into the Commons, and again was stoned, and again retreated, and still more joined the radicals.

At that point, Norman said, the guard advanced and the demonstrators headed between Stopher-Johnson Hall and Taylor Hall. The Guard plodded onto the football practice field, where the students splintered into small groups and surrounded the soldiers.

There were only 40 Guardsmen and more than 1,000 rock-throwing demonstrators, he said, so the soldiers fired tear gas until their supply was depleted. Then they beat a leasty retreat to the Taylor Hall wall, where the students followed and surrounded them.

ACCORDING to Norman and other witnesses, they formed a horseshoe within 25 yards of the Guardsmen and began pelting them with base-ball-sized rocks and beer and pop bottles. This from an area devoid of rocks and bottles, indicating the demonstrators came armed for action.

After a few minutes of sustained rock-throwing, and with a number of Guardsmen felled, Norman said he heard a sharp sound, "either a .22 or a firecracker and it sounded like it came from atop Taylor Hall or just to the right of it."

Next, the Guardsmen fired, and the demonstrators scattered. Norman, who fell to the ground on hearing the first shot, estimated that most of the shots were merely warnings, with a dozen or so lifed into the crowd.

Re memo SA 7/23/73 and Butel call b6 - 1 of Supervisor WILLIAM J. HINES, Civil Rights Section (CRS), b7C - 1 7/24/73.

On 7/24/73, Bureau Supervisor HINES, CRS, inquired as to the ultimate disposition of the weapon reportedly obtained from TERRY NORMAN, which gun is described as a S&W model 36 revolver, SN 253828.

It is noted that a large amount of evidence previously maintained by the FBI Laboratory was turned over to several investigators previously assigned to the Office of the Attorney General, State of Ohio during 1971 in connection with local charges and local Grand Jury investigation at Ravenna, Ohio. $$_{\rm b6-4}$$

It is believed instant S&W, which had been obtained from Detective KSU Police Department during May, 1970, and subsequently forwarded to the FBI Laboratory, was among the items obtained.

Since that time, as set forth in SA reference memo, it appears that the weapon in question has subsequently b6 - 1 been returned to the Smith & Wesson factory.

Upon a review of this file, there is no documented b6 - 1 indication to the contrary and the presumed disposition of the b7C - 1 weapon, including the contents in referenced memo of SA were made known to Bureau Supervisor WILLIAM J. HINES on 1/25/73.

Mr. HINES was also advised the FBI Laboratory had returned the five cartridges from the above weapon to the Cleveland Division and the cartridges are being retained by the Cleveland Division as evidence.

On 12/8/75 Supervisor PHILIP COOK called from the Bureau concerning captioned matter. He stated that captioned source, who is identical with TERRY NORMAN, is included among a list of individuals whom the Select Committee on Intelligence activities of the U.S. House of Representatives wish to question. Mr. COOK advised that the Bureau desires that NORMAN be contacted to determine if he has any objection to having information furnished by him to the FBI made available to the House Committee. He requested that NORMAN be located and contacted for this purpose.

A review of captioned file, as well as a check of references located in the 44 file concerning the KSU civil suit and civil rights investigation, disclosed no information concerning NORMAN's current whereabouts.

On 12/9/75 SA KENYON D. BOWES, JR. ascertained through the KSU Security Office that NORMAN is currently employed with in Washington, D.C.

On the morning of 12/9/75 I telephonically contacted Supervisor COOK to advise him that the most recent location for NORMAN known to this office is as set forth above. He stated he would have the matter pursued through WFO.
